Prevent unplanned pregnancies: help patients plan ahead and be prepared.

Did you know . . . that more than half of pregnancies in this community are UNPLANNED!

As a health care provider, you can encourage planned pregnancies by:

- Educating about birth control and emergency contraception.
- Preparing sexually active patients to handle a birth control emergency.
- Offering advance prescriptions for emergency contraception pills to interested female patients 17 years old and younger.

The **American Medical Association** encourages physicians and other health care professionals to:

- Play a more active role in providing education about emergency contraception by discussing it as part of their routine contraceptive counseling.
- Offer to write advance prescriptions for emergency contraception pills for their patients under 18 years old.

 (AMA policy H-75.985 Access to Emergency Contraception)

The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists recommends physicians can improve access by:

- Providing advance prescriptions or supply of emergency contraception.
- Prescribing by EC phone without requiring an office visit. (ACOG Practice Bulletin number 69 December 2005)

Educational messages for use with patients:

- Emergency contraception (EC) pills are best used as a **back up** to another of birth control.
- EC reduces the risk of pregnancy for **up to 5 days** after unprotected sex, but is most effective within the first 24 hours.
- EC does **NOT** protect from sexually transmitted infections or AIDS.
